



The terms of reuse, or licences, define what others can or cannot do with your published or unpublished work.

Based on copyright law, they facilitate the dissemination of your work by authorising certain uses, such as, redistribution, modification and translation.

When you deposit your work in HAL, applying a licence means you are **clearly choosing the conditions for its dissemination and reuse** (publications, data, software, etc.)

## Open source licences



**Creative Commons (CC)**: 6 different licences, each clearly stating the conditions for reuse (attribution, commercial use and possible modifications).



**The Etalab Open licence**: allows free reuse, including for commercial purposes, provided that the source and author are credited.

## Proprietary licence



**Copyright**: all rights reserved. Reuse only with the author's or publisher's permission.

## To remember in HAL

It is **mandatory** to specify the terms of reuse for any file deposited in HAL.

These conditions are determined by the author from a selection of licences offered in HAL.

The chosen licence must **comply** with the publisher's distribution agreements.

## Focus on CC licences

Creative Commons (CC) licences are **internationally recognised and compatible with French law**, including the Law for a Digital Republic. They allow authors to **transfer certain rights while retaining others**.

For example, an author may choose to allow the reproduction, distribution or modification of their work, **provided that the conditions specified in the chosen licence are met**.

Although **articles account for 51% of deposits in HAL**, licensing does not apply solely to these publications. All documents that can be deposited in HAL must be accompanied by conditions for reuse.

## Licences et publishers

Depositing an **author manuscript in HAL** under a licence **does not prevent you from publishing it in a journal**. The licence only applies to the version deposited in HAL and has no impact on the published version.

Most publishers have policies available for consultation regarding conditions for reuse. Tools such as **Mir@bel**, **Open policy Finder** and **DOAJ** can help you to make your choice.

## A mutual benefit

**Declaring the possible uses of your work** ensures that your copyright is respected.

**Assigning a reuse condition** helps to build an honest corpus, ensuring that each source can be used, transformed and cited legitimately thanks to its clear legal status.
